


The primary purpose of AFAM is the development and improvement of members' capabilities for research and teaching of management in organizations in Africa. The secondary purpose is the promotion and advancement of management in Africa. AFAM also provides an outlet for scholarly work on management in African organizations. We aim to

1. Foster the general advancement of knowledge and scholarship in the theory and practice of management among African scholars and/or academics interested in management and organization issues in Africa. Africa is defined broadly to include all of Africa and individuals of African descent in the Diaspora (i.e. The Caribbean, South America, Europe, Asia, Oceania, Middle East, and North America); and
2. Perform and support educational activities that contribute to the intellectual and operational leadership in the field of management within the African context.

- 2017 AFDW was hosted by the KNUST Business School in Kumasi, Ghana. The workshop was sponsored by ECOWAS Investment and Development Bank and 14 junior academics and doctoral students participated.
- 2015 AFDW held in Pretoria, South Africa. The workshop was sponsored by AFAM and the University of Pretoria. 20 junior academics and doctoral students participated.
- 2012 AFDW was held in Kigali, Rwanda. The workshop was sponsored by The Academy of Management (AOM). 15 junior academics and doctoral students participated.

We have launched a new initiative, **Africa Journal of Management (AJOM) Fellowship Program**. The AJOM Fellowship Program aims to match a promising young scholar from Africa with a mentor to work on joint research. The first sponsor of this Fellowship Program is the University of Wisconsin at Whitewater, USA, in 2017 and the second sponsor is McMaster University in Canada in 2019. We are seeking other university sponsors and we hope that you will help us to identify those that may be interested including your own Universities! We also have the **Stella Nkomo Junior Faculty Award** given to an African Junior Faculty who has published a high-quality paper in AJOM within the past year. Actions that may indicate “trailblazing” behavior include exemplary research contributions to knowledge about management issues in Africa; moving forward a content-related journal or scholarly series or advancing management education through an innovative, novel intervention.</p>
The Stella Nkomo Junior Faculty Award	<p>This award, named, Stella Nkomo Award for Best Paper published in the Africa Journal of Management by a Junior African Scholar, is intended to honor Prof. Stella Nkomo, the first President of the Africa Academy of Management (AFAM). The Stella Nkomo Award for the Best Paper by a Junior African Scholar, henceforth (SNABJAS) will be selected by the Editor-in-Chief and his team each calendar year beginning in 2018.</p>

The Fellowship seeks to assist a junior (early career) academic at an Africa-based university who has published in the Africa Journal of Management (AJOM) or presented a paper at Africa Academy of Management (AFAM) to undertake collaborative research with a senior academic through a mentorship relationship. The goal of the collaboration is a co-authored conference paper presentation and at least one journal article.</p>





Nigeria at a Glance

Nigeria traces its recent history to the amalgamation of the British protectorates of North and South Nigeria in 1914. It became an independent country on October 1, 1960 and having gone through several years of military coups and dictatorships, and one major civil war, it is now a democratic nation made up of a very determined and resilient group of people. Home to a diverse people consisting of over one thousand, one hundred and fifty (1150) different ethnicities and dialects, it is the most populous country in Africa with a population of over 200 million people. Nigeria is located in the West African region and shares borders with Niger in the North, Chad in the Northeast, Cameroun in the East, and Benin in the West. It is, however, its coastal South, located on the Gulf of Guinea in the Atlantic Ocean, which makes it an important economic hub for neighbouring countries.

It is very unlikely that there is a country in the world, which does not play host to a Nigerian. It is often said among Nigerians that one will find a Nigerian in the North Pole if there was potential for one form of advancement or the other, especially in terms of education and business. Nigerians are very social, hospitable and entrepreneurial individuals. The dominant ethnic groups and cultures include the Yoruba known for high levels of educational aspirations and attainment, and 'Owambes' (large, grandiose parties), Igbos known for business and trade, and the Hausas for cattle rearing, agriculture and governance, but these are just the general stereotypes coined out of a vast number of cultures and their unique characteristics. While there is a diversity of ethnic and cultural groups, you would be hard-pressed to find a Nigerian in the urban area that did not speak the English language (the country's official language) or its local variant known as 'pidgin' (Nigeria's Creole).

Apart from the unique characteristics of the Nigerian, it is no news that the country is blessed with immense natural resources including crude oil, natural gas, gold, tin ore, silver, coal, iron and other renewable and non-renewable resources in abundance, making it for many years, one of the highest recipients of foreign direct investment on the continent. Nigeria also features beautiful landscapes, waterfalls and ancient hills, including two UNESCO world heritage sites – the Sukur Cultural Landscape in the Northeast and the Osun-Oshogbo Grove in the West, and 13 other sites on the tentative list. Others include the Ikogosi warm springs, extinct volcanoes and mountains in the middle-belt state of Plateau, hills and caves in the eastern state of Enugu, and the Obudu Mountain Resort in Cross River state among others. While Nigerian cuisine is characteristically spicy, it reflects the nation's ethnic and cultural diversity. Popular staples include cassava-based garri and fufu, yam, rice, maize and beans meals; as well as soups such as egusi, edikaikong, afang, okro, ewedu and other vegetable-based delicacies. Nigerians also love their meats including chicken, beef, mouton and to lesser extent pork, as well as a variety of fish. A very popular breakfast staple is bread and eggs or just bread with butter or margarine, which is favoured largely for its convenience.

The social nature of Nigerians is reflected in the music, clothing and recreational activities. Nigerians have produced popular musicians such as Fela Kuti, King Sunny Ade, Wizkid, Burna Boy and so on. Nigeria's Nollywood is also among the top three largest movie industries in the world alongside America's Hollywood and India's Bollywood and has become arguably Nigeria's largest cultural export along with its music. Nigerians generally wear colourful attires such as the Ankara and other print fabrics that have now become popular on the global fashion scene, opulent and conspicuous accessories, as well as elaborate headgears, especially to parties. However, workwear still reflects colonial influence, is generally conservative and includes classic western outfits – suits, shirts, and so on.



Recommended Places to Visit in Lagos

Lekki Conservation Centre

Lekki Conservation Centre (LCC) was established in 1990 by the Nigerian Conservation Foundation (NCF). It has grown to be one of Africa's prominent and most-diverse urban Nature Parks due to its high species richness. It covers approximately 78 hectares of land area, extending from kilometer 19 along the Lagos-Epe Expressway and ends up a very close distance to the Atlantic Ocean near Okun Ibeju Village, Eti-Osa Local Government Area in the Eastern district of Lagos State. LCC can be accessed through the Lagos-Epe Expressway. Widely acclaimed as an icon of nature conservation and pearl of ecotourism, LCC represents the flagship project of NCF for the preservation of the unique biodiversity, scenic, natural, scientific and recreational values of the coastal environs of the south-western Nigeria.

Lufasi Nature Park

Lekki Urban Forest and Animal Sanctuary Initiative (LUFASI) is an urban forest park that sits on 20 hectares of land on the Lekki – Epe Express Way. This area was a patch of pristine coastal rain forest that has been protected since the Lekki Peninsula development started over 25 years ago. It contains some of the last populations of the endangered Ekki "Iron Wood" tree (*Lophira alata*), the critically endangered Hooded Vulture (*Necrosyrtes monachus*) and the Great Hornbill (*Buceros bicornis*).

Nike Art Gallery

Yemisi Shyllon Museum of Art - Pan-Atlantic University

Situated on a grassy site within the campus of the University, the 900sqm museum will host over a 1000 works of Yemisi Shyllon's vast art collection which includes over 7,000 artworks of sculptures, paintings and other media, as well as over 55,000 photographs of Nigeria's fast disappearing cultural festivals. The collection which has been built over the last 40 years has been celebrated by the Financial Times of London as one of the best 100 collections in the world and is valued in billions of Naira.

General Information

Climate and Weather

Average Weather in January in Lagos Nigeria: Daily high temperatures are around 90°F, rarely falling below 87°F or exceeding 93°F. Daily low temperatures are around 76°F, rarely falling below 70°F or exceeding 80°F.

Currency and ATMs & Credit Cards

The local currency is the Nigerian Naira (NGN). The Naira notes are available in denominations of 5, 10, 50, 100, 200, 500 and 1000. The exchange rate of the US\$ to the NGN has ranged between US\$1 = NGN 360 to US\$ 1= NGN 364 between January and October 2019. The average exchange rate is about \$1 = NGN 362. It is always advisable to have some amount of foreign currency in your wallet, especially one in demand, but you must be careful not to show it publicly as it can make you a target for theft. If you do bring dollars, be aware that many places will not accept US\$ denominations dated before 2009. ATMs are available throughout Lagos and MasterCard & Visa are accepted at main establishments.

Health

Yellow fever is a risk in certain parts of Nigeria, so the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that travelers going to Nigeria should receive vaccination against yellow fever at least 10 days before travel and should take steps to prevent mosquito bites while there. It is strongly recommended that those who have never been vaccinated against yellow fever must receive the vaccination before they travel to Nigeria. Note that an International Certificate of Vaccination for yellow fever is required for all travelers. You should also check the visa application requirements and immigration rules in your home country. Your doctor can help you decide if this vaccine is right for you based on your travel plans. Always talk to your doctor before you travel.

Language

English is the official language in Nigeria. The major languages are Hausa, Yoruba, Igbo (Ibo), and Fulani. There are over 500 additional indigenous languages (The CIA World Factbook, 2019).

Safety Tips

Safety can be a concern when visiting any large urban city like Lagos. But all you need to do is take the usual sensible precautions and follow some basic safety rules. Below are some safety tips that we will recommend to you so that you will have a pleasant experience:

- Leave your passport, air ticket and other valuables in the safety deposit box in your hotel room. Always carry a photocopy of your passport with you and keep photocopies of your credit and debit cards in a safe place. You should obtain the phone number of your respective embassy or consulate.
- Always carry on you the essential numbers of your travel and health insurance and important local phone numbers (perhaps the number of your consulate or embassy in Nigeria) to call in case of emergency.
- Use automatic teller machines ATMs at secure places.
- When walking, do not wear visible jewelry or carry cameras and computer bags over your shoulder.
- Limit the amount of money you carry on you and keep mobile phones and wallets safe.
- Travel and walk with others where possible (especially after dark).

Make your transport arrangements from the airport to your hotel prior to travelling to avoid relying on strangers.

AFAM has organized for conference delegates to visit one of our three selected indigenous organizations in Nigeria. There are limited spaces per trip. Availability is on a first-come-first served basis. We encourage participants to sign up at the registration desk latest **Thursday January 9th, 2020 by 12:00pm.**

Dangote Refinery

The refinery is located on a 2,500 hectares site at the Lekki Free Trade Zone, Ibeju-Lekki, Lagos. It is expected to process about 650,000 barrels of crude oil daily which will be transported through pipelines from oil fields in the Niger Delta. Natural gas will also be sourced for the fertilizer factory at the refinery to be used in generating electricity for the refinery complex. Due to its single crude oil distillation unit, the refinery has the potential of becoming the largest single-train crude oil refinery in the world. At full capacity, the refinery will produce 50 million litres (13,000,000 US gal) of gasoline and 17 million litres (4.5million US gal) of fossil diesel daily, as well as jet fuel and plastic products. It is expected that the refinery's capacity will be able to meet Nigeria's entire domestic fuel demand, as well as export demands.

Eko Atlantic City


Eko Atlantic City, officially Nigeria International Commerce city, is an entirely new coastal city being built on Victoria Island adjacent to Lagos, Nigeria. It is a planned city which stands on a 10million squares metres of land restored from the sea and guarded by an 8.5km long coastal defence. Eko Atlantic is planned to be the size of "Manhattan's skyscraper district. The city is expected to be self-sufficient and sustainable. It will include state-of-the-art urban design, its own power generation, clean water, advanced telecommunications, spacious roads and tree-lined streets.

Tolaram Group

Tolaram created a niche for itself in the Nigerian market in 1988 when it started importing instant noodles into the country. Ever since, the company has expanded and grown their "*Indomie*" instant noodle sales to an estimate of \$700 million a year. Tolaram entered into the Nigerian market with a mission to provide affordable and high-quality products to the low- and middle-income earners in the country. To implement this vision, Tolaram developed a business model that allowed it to sell its product profitably for as little as N50 (13 cents). To function properly in Nigeria without the necessary infrastructure such as roads, reliable electricity and water supply, etc, Tolaram had to integrate across multiple components in its value chain. It had to build an interdependent system. Tolaram provides its own electricity; manages a fleet of more than 2,000 trucks for its logistics; and owns a palm oil factory (palm oil is one of the products needed to make instant noodles). Currently, Tolaram has 17 manufacturing plants in Nigeria (including noodles, flour, palm oil, seasoning, etc.); a packaging company; and a logistics company.


